HARROW NEWS

LIFTS AT HARROW ON THE HILL STATION

After many broken promises, over many years, work really is in progress on a step-free access to Harrow on the Hill station.

I am told, work is in progress as planned, piling work and excavation for new lift pits continue and work on the platform canopies to accommodate the new lift towers. The key new structures will be craned into place and the fitting out of the new lifts/bridge will continue until the end of the year. The new lifts should be installed in early 2020 and opened in the Spring.

In the meanwhile, we will have to put up with the building work but feel most sorry for those who have to work there and those who live nearest!

HARROW HISTORY

The origins of the name 'Harrow' – is something we take for granted - but the name covers a great deal of history.

The word 'Harrow' derives from the Saxon word *hergae* of which there are many varied spellings and which means a temple or shrine. The earliest known document relating to Harrow is a charter covering a grant of land by Offa, Saxon King of Mercia, who had converted to Christianity, to Abbot Stidberht of St. Albans in A.D.767. The grant was 30 hides of land which covered land between Gumengga Hergae (the original name for Harrow) and the Lidding (probably the Kenton) Brook. A hide was roughly equivalent to 120 acres so Offa's gift was likely to cover the areas now known as South Kenton, Greenhill, Wembley Park and Harrow School Football fields.

Offa's successor, Cenwolf, confirmed the grant on the reverse side of the document in the year A.D.801, but later seized the land for himself. Cenwolf was succeeded by his son, Kenelm, aged seven, but Kenelm was murdered by his half-sister, Cwoenthryt in A.D.825.

There is evidence of large numbers of pigs in Harrow which were fed on the acorns and beechnuts from the heavily wooded area around Harrow. Deer were also plentiful as evidenced by a charter from King William instructing those 'on the lands of Lanfranc, the Archbishop which belong to his Manor of Harrow ye chase neither stags nor hind nor fallow deer, nor hunt all of them, except so far as he may order or permit'. So, there is a lot of history in the title of Harrow. For a broad history of Harrow why not visit the Harrow Museum at Headstone Manor, Pinner View, HA2 6PX. <https://headstonemanor.org>

It is free and very interesting.

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Contacting Police – A Greenhill Guide

Imminent risk to life, limb or property? Suspect present right now?

CALL 999!

Obviously, this applies to serious offences and threats, but also if a suspect is present then and there, and there is a real risk of your

property being stolen or damaged. As an example, if a suspect is on your drive and trying your car door handle, it is absolutely appropriate to call 999 so a unit can be dispatched.

Low-level crime or victimless crime (e.g. drug deal)? Crime has already occurred and suspect no longer present?

CALL 101 or report online.

The Online Reporting Tool - <https://www.met.police.uk/ro/report/> - is a very quick and convenient way of reporting incidents and you can even upload images and footage. Calling 101, the non-emergency number, is also an option but there will be wait times involved depending on the demand.

Intelligence? Antisocial behaviour?

Report online or anonymously via Crimestoppers.

Again, we'd strongly suggest reporting antisocial behaviour via the online tool (<https://www.met.police.uk/ro/report/>). For example, if you notice suspicious behaviour on your road, or you have information about drug use or dealers, reporting this to us lets us directly follow it up.

If you want to give us information but want to remain totally anonymous, contact Crimestoppers at <https://crimestoppers-uk.org/> or on 0800555111. All calls and contact are completely confidential – they will not ask your name, address or trace the call in any way. Information goes directly to us, but NOT any details about the source.

If you want to give us information or intelligence you can also contact your local Greenhill safer neighbourhood team – see Useful Telephone Numbers below.

WhatsApp? Nextdoor?

In this day and age, lots of neighbours use social media such as WhatsApp or Nextdoor to keep in touch. We've heard that plenty of people share images of suspicious people or activity with their neighbours. Generally speaking this is okay – after all you have the right to take pictures in public and being vigilant is never a bad thing. Social media platforms also have their own terms of service and will tell you if you are breaching them. *However*, remember that CCTV has to be limited to your own property and you may run into issues if you are publishing CCTV images/footage of public pavements or highways,

especially if sharing on public networks such as Facebook. It is also not a good idea to make any allegations about people on public platforms (e.g. YouTube, Twitter and Facebook) for obvious reasons.

Ultimately, if we (the police) don't know about it, we can't try to identify this people or look to solve the issue. Tell us.

Online Watch Link – OWL

If you have access to email, you can register to join this service, which will keep you up to date on what is happening. 2 people living in our streets were scammed in Tesco car park. If they had known about OWL, this is the message they would have received:

Scam alert

Please be aware of scammers in car parks pretending to be working for NCP! On Monday 21/10/19 at midday, victim was at Tesco Superstore car park on Station Road. While she was trying to park her vehicle, she saw a male in a white vehicle taking pictures of her.

When victim parked the car, a second male, alleging to be the manager of Tesco and showing her an official looking badge, jumped in the car and said that the male taking the pictures was working for NCP and that she was liable for a £100 fine, but this could be cancelled within 10 minutes if the victim would drive with him to the nearest NCP car park in Harrow Wealdstone and pay by card, which she did several times and her cards were swallowed by the machine.

OWL is now live in Harrow!

OWL allows the Police to quickly alert you to crimes in your immediate area, and crime prevention messages can be sent to you by both the Police and Neighbourhood Watch. It is a huge leap forward in enabling the Police and the public to work together in closer partnership.

We invite you and your neighbours to sign up to OWL today at the following address: <https://www.owl.co.uk>

Simply enter your Postcode, fill out your details on the screen, and submit. As soon as we receive your request we will put your details onto OWL within a few working days, and you will receive an email with your login and password.

OWL is a secure system, it is **free to use**, and your details will never be used or sold on for marketing purposes - it is the **ONLY** secure communications system in the UK that is **Police approved** under the "Secured By Design" scheme. Your contact details are only visible to the Police, your Watch Coordinator (if one exists for your road) and senior Community/Ward Coordinators.

You won't need to log in to OWL to see alerts - they will come straight to your email or mobile phone inbox - the system is very simple to use.

OWL will be the primary way that your local police communicate with residents it also provides a great platform for local residents to contact their officers about concerns important to them.

The Friends of St Mark's Hospital, a small charity, is run by a dedicated group of volunteers for the benefit of the patients.

When a patient or visitor first comes to St Mark's, they may not be familiar with the geography of the hospital, as the entrance on level 3 also leads to Northwick Park Hospital via the Link Corridor on Level 4 and Cardiology is on level 9. This is when a Meeter and Greeter Volunteers steps forward and offers helpful information and direction. At the moment we have a three regular volunteers Meeting and Greeting, but we would very much like more, as it is a much needed and appreciated service.

On level 3 is also the Friends of St Mark's Tea Bar selling delicious sandwiches and a variety of hot and cold snacks, all reasonably priced. Vernon, the tea bar manager, has two paid staff but also five volunteers who help at the till. More volunteers would be most welcome, especially taking a trolley with food and drink to the operating theatres (not actually into the theatre), as staff there find it helpful not to have to get changed and walk out to get some refreshments.

A trolley is taken to Frederick Salmon Ward and the Intestinal Recovery Unit fortnightly selling various items which patients might find useful or even remind them of St Mark's! On both these wards there has been a desire to have a friendly volunteer to visit patients who may be in hospital for a long time and may not have many visitors.

The search for volunteers continues. If you know of someone who has a few hours to spare, once a week or once a fortnight, please get in touch.
